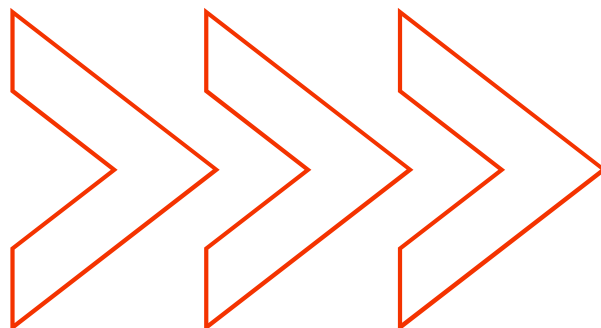

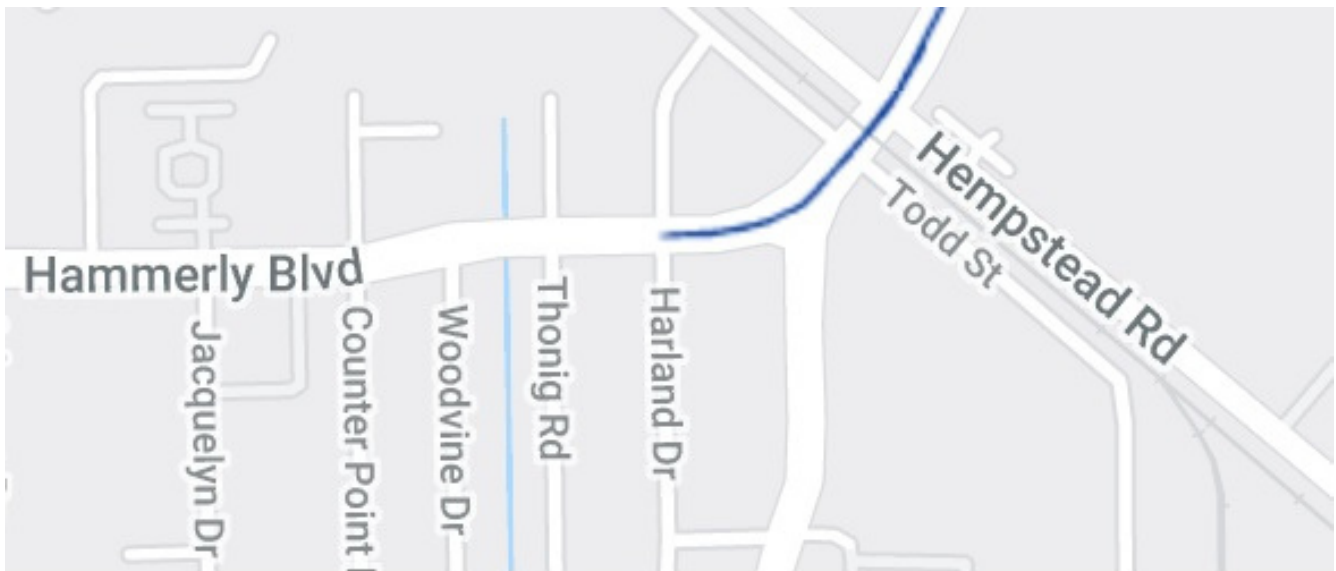
Capital Improvement Plan Projects

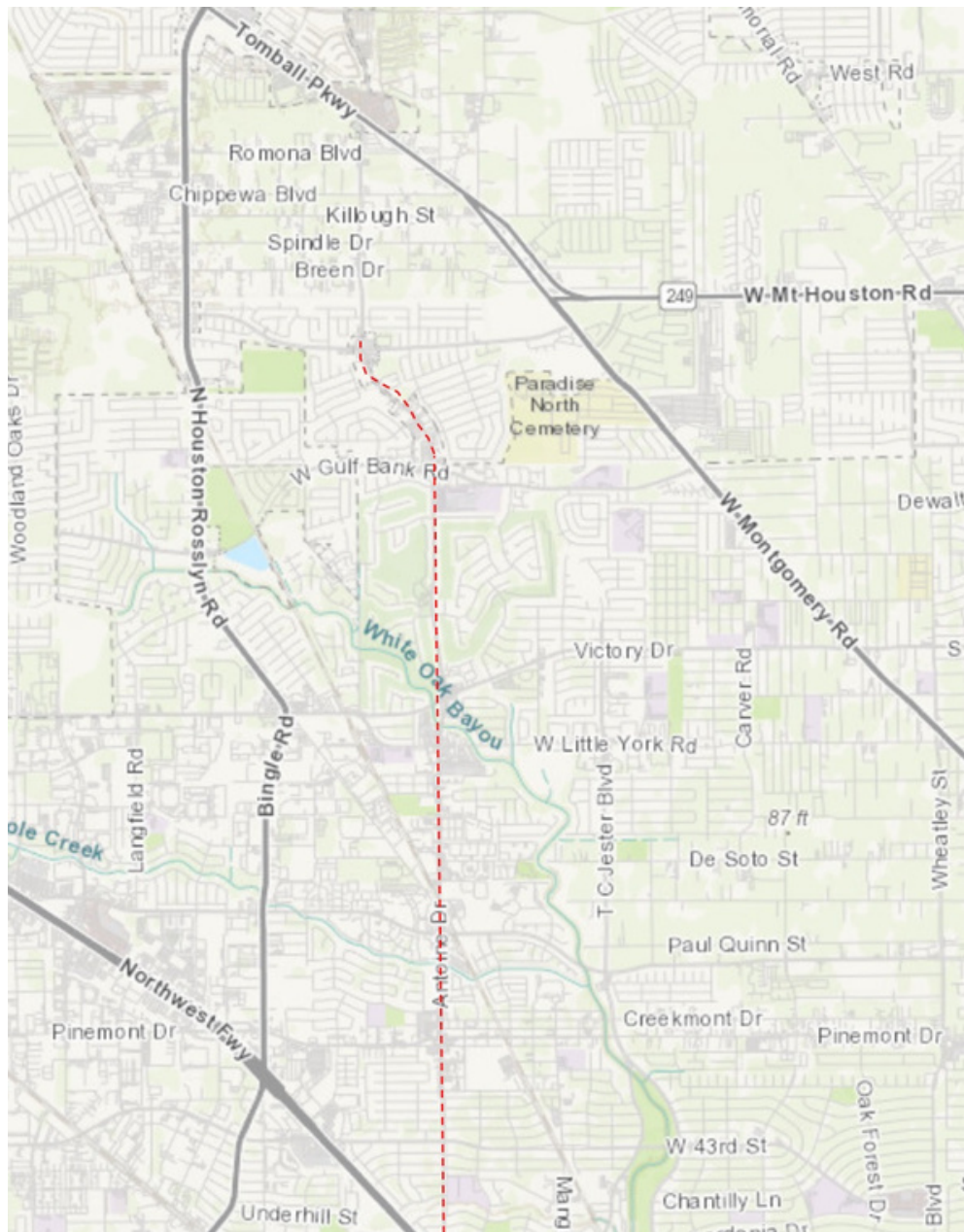
Antoine Drive Drainage & Paving at Hempstead In Design Estimated Cost: \$6,115,973

Estimated Cost: \$137M



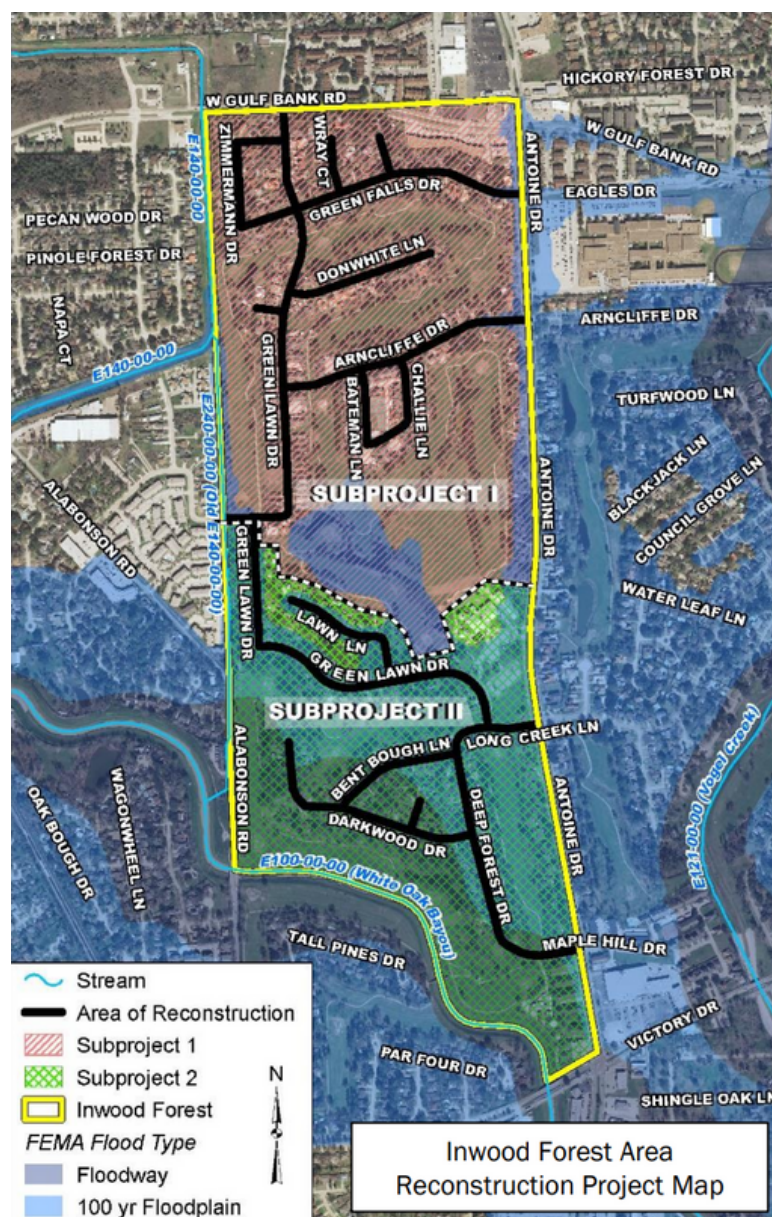
Chateau Forest Drainage & Paving Construction Begins in Winter 2023 Estimated Cost: \$15,995,614

The project will improve the Spring Shadows - North area neighborhood streets and drainage. Reconstruction will include storm drainage, pavement, sidewalks, and street lighting.

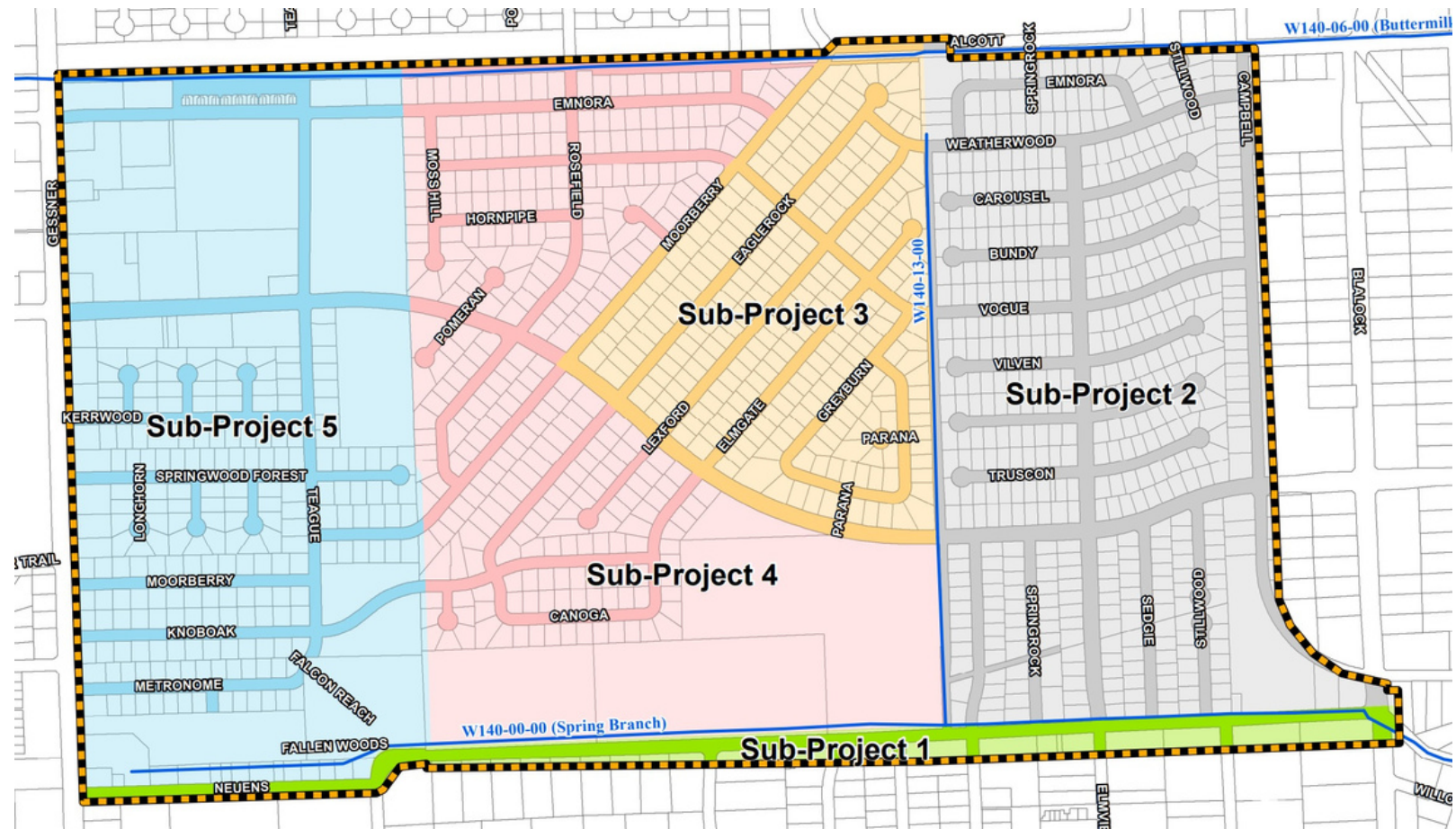

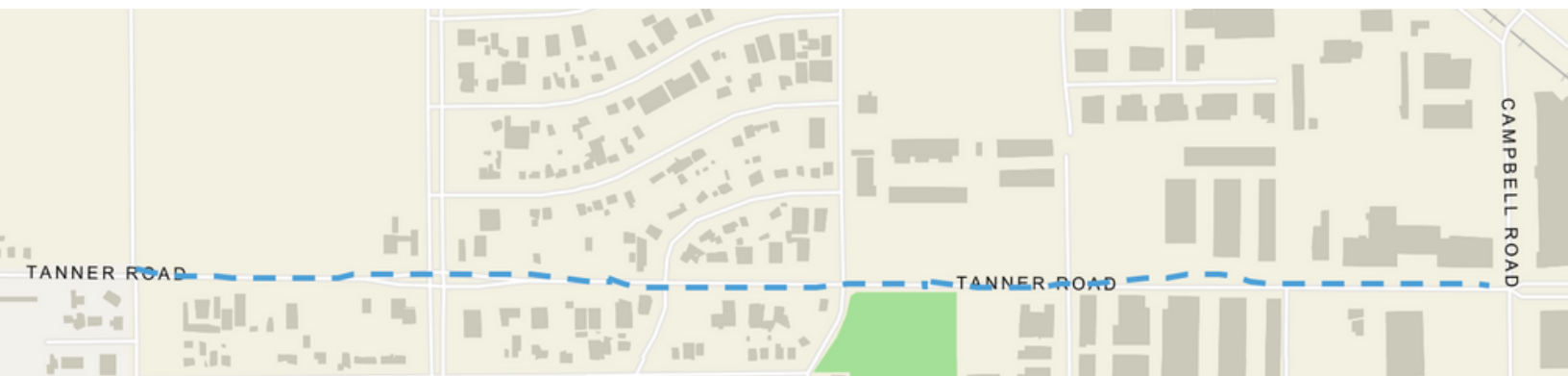

Public Safety Initiatives in District A

- ☒ Directed almost \$400,000 to HPD for overtime
- ☒ Created the Neighborhood Patrol Program for HPD officers to patrol neighborhoods
- ☒ Purchased gunshot detection technology for District A
- ☒ Spearheaded purchasing of license plate reader technology to notify HPD about stolen vehicles/individuals with warrants
- ☒ Directed funds to install speed cushions in neighborhoods to slow traffic
- ☒ Created a disaster recovery plan for District A (including a partnership with the Houston ToolBank)
- ☒ Started an overtime initiative with HPD for inspections of slum apartments as well as enforcement for corrections

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District A Crime Statistics



Violent Crime **DOWN** 7%



Aggravated Assault **DOWN** 9%



Murder **DOWN** 44%



Sexual Assault **DOWN** 24%

Although crime is down compared to last year, it is still higher than any of us would like to see. The District A office maintains a great working relationship with HPD, and safety is our top priority.

I will continue funding overtime and technology for HPD in 2023.

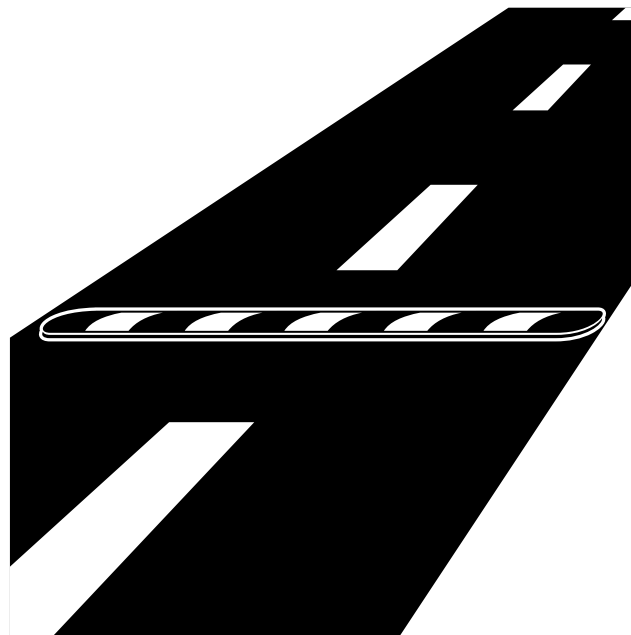

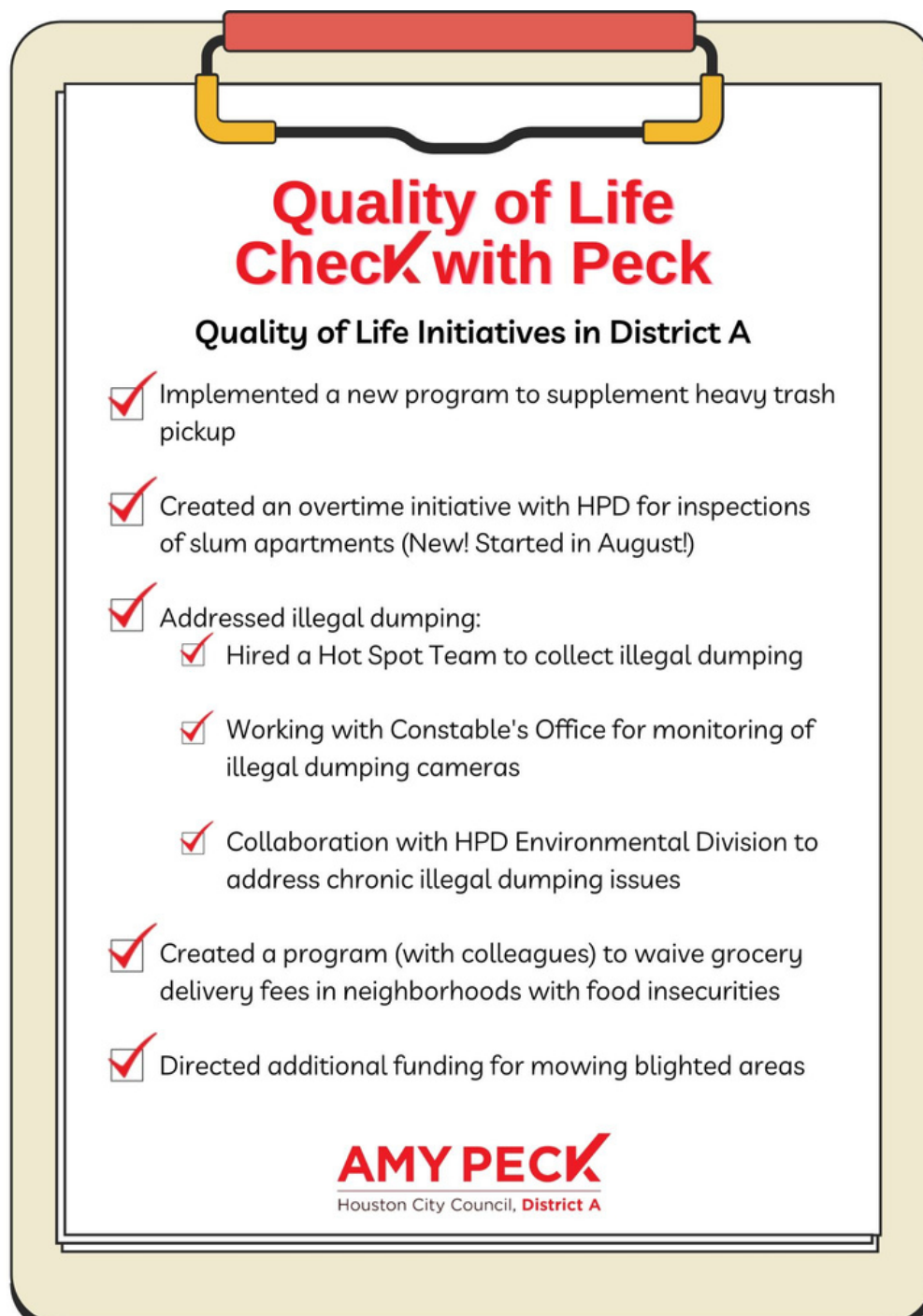
